

Year 5 Leadership Programme

While the Year 6 students were at swimming over the past two weeks, the Year 5 students took part in a Leadership Programme to help prepare them for next year. During this programme the students looked at the positions that might be available next year and then discussed what other positions could be created. We talked about our strengths and how these can be used to be a leader. Each of the students took home a sheet with the strengths their friends, family and teachers thought they have. These were done so that if the students are having a tough day, they can read them and it should make them feel better. We then talked about the qualities a leader may have. There was plenty of discussion around how being a good friend was actually not the important quality. After a game of leading each other around blind-folded, the students realised that having a leader they trusted was very important. We talked about the values we have been taught by our families, which are either good or bad. We broke these down into values that anyone should show and then any specific values a leader would have as well.
